Archeology buffs will delight in having the State's archeologist along during a tour of Pine Bluff's prehistoric sites (dinosaurs and Native American) and the University of Wyoming's Archeological Museum and dig site. Wyoming's best known historian will regale delegates with the colorful history of nearby Laramie. And on the Wagon Doctors Tour, delegates will learn how to repair wagons using wagons from the Cheyenne Frontier Days™ and see the famous Yellow Coach from Yellowstone.

Participants in our historic preservation workshop will receive security clearance to F.E. Warren Air Force Base. There they will learn about historic preservation specifically for museums while surrounded by the Base's historic district of late 19th and early 20th century brick structures. Wyoming's State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) is presenting this workshop. Later in the conference there will be a preservation session presented by the National Trust's regional director and the SHPO from South Dakota. These will be rare chances to learn those pesky preservation words and why the old building in which your museum is located is important and could be eligible for financial incentives.

As you peruse our "New West Solutions in Old West Settings" program, you'll see many sessions devoted to new economic challenges, new technologies, and new ideas. But the past is still prologue to the future. We'll deal with Western Art contemporary and traditional - with special presentations by acclaimed experts in the field - and witness how the 1930s and 1940s work of Wyoming's Thomas Molesworth continues to influence Western design. After the Molesworth furniture session, we'll all visit the State Museum to see the special exhibit of his western-style furniture.

Our roster of keynote speakers is strong. Dr. Anne-Imelda Radice, director of the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), will talk about insights she has gleaned about museums over her distinguished career. Former U.S. Senator Alan Simpson and his brother Pete Simpson, distinguished Political Science Professor at the University of Wyoming, will talk about politics and the west. This duo is so popular that we'll open up their talk to the people of Cheyenne. The storytelling will continue with Phil Roberts, Wyoming's best known historian, telling us tales of old Wyoming. Tales of Washington will be told by Ford Bell, President/CEO of the American Association of Museums, who will join Dr. Radice in answering questions at an open forum.

Cheyenne was voted True West magazine's top western town for 2009. It was a center of the Old West and is a happening place in the New West. So saddle up Old Paint and join us!

Wednesday, October 7, 2009 OPENING KEYNOTE ADDRESSES

Milward A. Simpson: — Wyoming's Museums: Services, Outreach, Partnerships

Wyoming's Director of the Department of State Parks and Cultural Resources talks about how museums are doing around the state and gives an update on the progress made through private/public partnerships and how this has benefited all the museums in the state.

Ford W. Bell: — A View over the Horizon

As the President of the American Association of Museums, Ford Bell remarks on the challenges and opportunities that lie ahead for the museum field. As museum professionals seek solutions for day-today issues, strive for financial stability and cultivate audiences, AAM is rethinking the role it plays in the museum community and beyond. Bell will discuss what he's learned about the field and the steps AAM is taking to increase participation in professional standards programs (including the reinvention of AAM's accreditation program) and to strengthen advocacy for museums. He will also share findings from AAM's Center for the Future of Museums (CFM) report, "Museums & Society 2034: Trends and Potential Futures." AAM started CFM as a place for museums and experts outside of the field to help museums use trends data to plan more thoughtfully for the long-term and encourage museums to play a larger role in helping society face the significant challenges posed by the future.

Dr. Anne-Imelda Radice: Looking Ahead

As Dr. Radice completes her term as Director of the Institute of Museum and Library Services, she reflects on the current state of museums and libraries across the country and around the world. She hopes to highlight programs that have grown during her tenure as Director: specifically, Connecting to Collections: A Call to Action, international collaboration, and youth development. Dr. Radice will also talk about what she sees as the future direction museums and libraries should take as this society becomes increasingly more dependent on 21st Century skills and cross-cultural collaboration."

Special Recognition of Senator Michael Enzi (R-WY) by Ford W. Bell, CEO, American Association of Museums, Washington, D.C. Introduced by James C. McNutt, President & CEO, National Museum of Wildlife Art, Jackson, WY

Alan and Pete Simpson: A New Cork in an Old Flask -

A "Simpson Eye" View of the West.

Two western icons representing one of the most beloved and charismatic of Wyoming "First Families" reflect on the tensions, the triumphs and the turbulence of Wyoming's colorful history and the paradoxes the "cowboy state" faces as it wrestles to reconcile its old west legacy with the challenges of a new world. "Al and Pete Simpson are treasure troves of Western wit and folklore," says CU-Boulder history Professor Patricia Limerick, "Anybody who claims to know the West, needs to know the Simpsons."

Alan K. Simpson served as U.S. Senator from the State of Wyoming from 1979 through 1996. He was the Assistant Republican Leader (Republican Whip) from 1985 until 1995, serving in that position longer than any other person in U.S. history. He also served as Chairman of the Senate Veterans Affairs Committee and was a member of the Finance Committee, Chairman of the Nuclear Regulation Subcommittee and Chairman of the Immigration and Refugee Policy Subcommittee. Simpson has also been a visiting Lecturer and the Director of the Institute of Politics at the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University and was a member of the Iraq Study Group, Board of Trustees of the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, and the Board of Regents of the Smithsonian Institution, Washington, D.C. Simpson is currently Chairman, Board of Trustees, Buffalo Bill Historical Center, Cody, WY.

Dr. Peter K. Simpson is the Distinguished Simpson Professor in Political Science at the University of Wyoming. He has been a major contributor to the study of Wyoming history and politics and is the author of "The Community of Cattlemen" and other works in the field of history. Pete's public service and community involvement are extensive. He was twice elected to the Wyoming House of Representatives and was the Republican Party's nominee for Governor in 1986. The many boards on which Pete has served include the UW Foundation Board: board of directors of Great Plains History and Folklore, Inc.; the Ivinson Memorial Hospital Foundation Board; the Library Advisory Committee of the Buffalo Bill Historical Center Board; and the Wyoming Council for the Humanities. Among his many awards are Exemplary Alumnus of the UW College of Arts and Sciences and the Wyoming Recreation Commission Award for Single Contributions to Historic Preservation.

Dr. Philip J. Roberts: "Equality State/Cowboy State: Perspectives on Wyoming History"

Wyoming's best known historian provides a broad overview of the cultural identity in Wyoming and its historical influences. Dr. Roberts is associate professor of history, University of Wyoming (UW) where he has been on the faculty since 1990 and teaches the history of Wyoming and the West and legal, public and environmental history. He holds a Ph.D. in history from the University of Washington. A graduate of UW's College of Law, he practiced law, worked in public history, owned a publishing company, and published a city magazine in Cheyenne. He has written extensively on Wyoming history, co-authoring the Wyoming Almanac and editing a compilation of history essays. His syndicated column, Buffalo Bones: Stories from Wyoming's Past, ran for years in three dozen Wyoming newspapers. Roberts is currently at work on a comparative analysis of oil development in the American West and the Arab Middle East and has served as visiting lecturer at two universities in the Middle East.






Historic Preservation Basics and When the Setting is Part of the Presentation: Museums in Historic Buildings





PRE-CONFERENCE TOURS

MPMA always has good tours, and this year is no exception. Travel to historic sites with someone who knows all the stories and where to look. And go where tourists don't get to go. These opportunities were created especially for this conference by the Conference Host Committee. Pre-Conference Tours are on Tuesday, October 6, 2009.

FULL-DAY TOURS

T1 These Walls do Talk! The Big Houses of Laramie

8:30 am — 4:30 pm (\$35) Visit the town of Laramie with Wyoming's best known historian, Dr. Phil Roberts, who knows Laramie's stories and history as well as anyone. He'll tell you how the Gem City was founded by the Union Pacific Railroad in April 1868 near the site where the Overland Trail stage route crossed the Laramie Plains earlier in that decade. Roberts will show you around the town that was deemed "ungovernable" in the 1860s. You'll see the Wyoming

Territorial Prison. Built in 1872 and now a beautifully restored historic site, the prison held some of the most notorious outlaws in the region, including Butch Cassidy. This stop includes a tour of the prison's working Broom Factory. Back in the saddle, you'll see how the west was won when visiting other sites: the elegant and historic Ivinson Mansion that also houses the Laramie Plains Museum, the American Heritage Center and the University of Wyoming Art Museum. Lunch included.

T2 Fort Laramie: Crossroads of a Nation moving West! 9:00 am — 4:30 pm (\$35)

Travel to one of Wyoming's most impressive 19th-century forts and follow in the footsteps of emigrants while exploring the Oregon Trail. Fort Laramie was established in 1834, to secure the Oregon Trail. It witnessed the entire sweep of America's western expansion and Indian resistance to encroachment on their lands. Those who passed through or near the fort include: James Bridger, Kit Carson,

the Donner Party, John C. Fremont, Brigham Young, Spotted Tail, Red Cloud, Crazy Horse, General William T. Sherman, Wild Bill Hickok, Mark Twain, Wyatt Earp and Buffalo Bill Cody. The tour will include Register Cliff, an enormous rock that became a 'chalkboard' for pioneers to sign their names. Experience Deep Rut Hill, the location of some of the most spectacular ruts remaining along the Oregon Trail. Tour Fort Laramie with costumed interpreters and then observe a lime grout patching demonstration of historic structures while discussing with the fort's exhibit specialists the challenges of historic structure maintenance and repair. Also included is a look at the Fort's 1866 Barrack's archeological excavation. Tour led by Baird Todd, Fort Laramie's Museum Specialist. Lunch included.

T3 WYOMING ARCHAEOLOGY: High Plains Archaeology Project 10:00 am — 4:00 pm (\$35)

Travel with State Archeologist Danny Walker to the small town of Pine Bluffs, the location of University of Wyoming High Plains Archaeology Project (HPA) and one of the largest and most interesting concentrations of prehistoric and early historic sites in the state. Walker will regale you with stories about the people who lived in the area around Cheyenne for over 10,000 years and tell you about other Wyoming archaeological sites.

The Pine Bluffs trip will be led by Dr. Charles Reher, University of Wyoming Archaeologist and HPA Director, and will include the High Plains Archaeology Museum and Field Lab (where artifacts from the area are on display) and the Windows on the Past Interpretive Center. This structure is built over the main excavation area at the Pine Bluffs Site where stratified deposits contain 20 cultural levels extending from the Early Historic Frontier era back 10,000 years to Paleo-Indian times. The tour group will then move on to the Pine Bluffs Overlook area on the bluffs above the town where original trails can be seen. You'll hear about other archaeological and early historic resources in the area including 2,500 stone circles (tipi rings), thousands of fire pits, Native American travois trails, the 1840's Lodgepole Emigrant Trail, an 1880 U.S. Cavalry base and more. Lunch included.

HALF-DAY TOUR

T4 Tracking Trains in Cheyenne 1:00 pm — 4:30 pm (\$20)

All aboard for an exciting tour on railroading. This tour will take you back to the time when the railroad was the lifeblood to the plains and Rocky Mountains. You will visit historic trains: the oldest locomotive in Wyoming, the "1242," which is one of the oldest intact

locomotives ever to run in

the Union Pacific fleet:

pull a 3600-ton train over steep grades between Cheyenne and Ogden, Utah; and the Merci Train, a gift from the French who in appreciation for the American Friendship Train that supplied food to the French during World War II, deposited a boxcar full of presents at each state capital. You will also visit the historic Union Pacific Roundhouse and Steam Shop where you'll see more trains and antique passenger cars and have a peek inside to see how the roundhouse radiated out from the turntable.

New Approaches to Perpetual Challenges

While museums are constantly evolving and changing, some issues seem to remain constant: How do we respond to economic uncertainty? The art of the West is not only about cowboys and Indians, or sublime mountain vistas. Romantic realism and academic impressionism, though still widely practiced and celebrated, are not the only styles of art being produced in this rapidly changing region. Following World War II, modernism began to take root in Montana and Art departments grew at the University of Montana and at Montana State University. In the sixties, art centers opened and the works of this western avant garde began to be seen more widely. In the 1980s, the Yellowstone Art Center (now the Yellowstone Art Museum) in Billings became the first regional museum to actively collect this work. Drawing on his experience as a curator at the Yellowstone Art Center during the years when the museum's celebrated Montana Collection was initially assembled, Gordon McConnell will talk about the history of contemporary art in Montana and how a small group of non-traditional artists created a new tradition and a small museum built a unique collection of their work.



T5 Behind-the-scenes Collections Tour

Visit storage facilities at two of Cheyenne's finest museums as well as the state museum. The Nelson Museum of the West features a spectacular collection of Cowboy and Native American objects as well as fine Western art; its small but beautiful storage and collections-processing area is a must-see. The Historic Governors' Mansion is a stately and massive Colonial Revival 1905 home that has wonderful high-style furnishings dating back to the early 20th century. Its collection reflects 20th century décor of 1905, 1937, 1955 and 1960 eras throughout the home, including a Cold War era bomb shelter. A final stop will be at the Wyoming State Museum's new off-site storage facility which houses the majority of the state's vast collection.

T6 City Trolley Tour

Jump aboard the City's cute and colorful trolley for a personal, historical tour of Cheyenne. You'll get an "overview" of the town, starting with how the town began and how it grew into True West Magazine's best western town of today. The "Magic City of the Prairie" sprang up in 1867 when the Union Pacific Railroad arrived and it quickly became the richest city per capita in the world. See its streets that once were filled with both fine millinery shops and dust and dirt from cattle drives. Imagine how exciting those early days were, filled with great promise and a place where wealthy easterners came to play. Today, the remnants of yesterday can still be found in downtown's well-preserved buildings and grand mansions.
